TRUSTEES RESPOND QUICKLY TO SUPPLY EMERGENCY FUNDING.

RECENTLY THE TRUSTEES have responded to two requests for emergency funding from local charities. The first came in from The Silver Road Community Centre Food Bank, which is run and organised by local volunteer manager Julie Brociek-Coulton. Julie was asking for emergency funding to keep the food bank running. Responding to the request, Trustee Rowland Cogman said "the Trustees have supported the Silver Road Community Centre Food Bank in the past, with donations of £1,000 in 2021 and £1,500 in 2022 and clearly there was a need to try to help really quickly. The trustees agreed to give emergency funding of £1,000 to help them keep the food bank going in these difficult times."









The second call for emergency funding related to the Phoenix Centre in Mile Cross (an area of Norwich recognised for its deprivation) who had an immediate deficit to clear whilst exploring all avenues to keep the Centre going. The centre plays a crucial role in the local community and hands out free lunches to children who otherwise would not have eaten. The plight of this centre was highlighted in a recent edition of the Evening News newspaper. The trustees agreed to give emergency funding of $\pounds 2,000$ to keep the centre going whilst it seeks a sustainable and viable solution going forward.

Commenting on the Trust's emergency grant awards, Nigel Savory, Chairman said "whilst we do have a quarterly Trust meeting which allows all Trustees to collectively review the requests for grants which have come in, in these difficult times we also have to be cognisant of the need to act swiftly when it's necessary."

Trusts donations having a significant effect

IN THIS EDITION we continue to look at how the grants awarded by Trustees have helped local good causes. A grant given in January to a charity called the Respite Association, which provides Norfolk carers with support, is a typical example of what can be achieved with the grants which are given. John Turner MBE, the charity organiser said "Your support in January, especially in these most challenging of times, meant so much to us and to the many carers that we have been able to support across Norfolk and I wanted to write and thank you once again, and to update you on how your kindness has made a difference to so many lives."

John went on to provide examples of how the carers were helped, including a lady who looks after her 45 year old daughter who has brittle bone disease, and a lady who looks after her elderly Mum who has heart failure, arthritis and a hearing impairment. The few hours of respite the charity can provide is really appreciated by these hard working carers and the Trustees were pleased to have been able to help in this way.

Another charity which was recently helped by the Trust was Happy Days, which is a charity which helps children with profound and multiple learning difficulties to experience the normal things which life has to offer. In December 2022, this charity received a grant of £1,500 from the Trust and Ryan Sinclair, their CEO wrote to explain how the grant had been used.

"On 5 January, 45 people from Norwich aged between 3 and 17 who all have multiple learning difficulties and many have autism too, watched a show entitled "Snow White", performed by a visiting theatre company. The show was designed to help with their sensory awareness and to improve their social and communication skills, whilst at the same time giving the children some excitement and fun. This enabled the children to feel a part of the wider community thereby, increasing their social inclusion."

After the show the children were encouraged to write and draw pictures to demonstrate what they thought of it, with one youngster describing the show as their '*best day ever*."
