

Welcome to EP Youth

Important food bank and support charity gets support from the Trust.

IN OCTOBER, EP YOUTH, a charity in Fakenham who specialise in helping to support vulnerable young people in North Norfolk, approached the Trust for support. A grant of £1,000 was given, which helped a lot in the running of the charity's activities. Helping young adults gain important City & Guilds qualifications as well as making sure that they have access to good quality food at reasonable prices was obviously a good cause. At the end of December, Lucinda Freestone, the Charity's Administrator wrote to the Trustees to thank them for the grant and explained how important the grant had been. "We became part of the Nourishing Norfolk Network in January and with the help of the R C Snelling Charitable Trust we were able to successfully help over 2,000 young people and over 100 vulnerable households in and around Fakenham", explained Lucinda. 😃

BASED IN ASHWELLTHORPE, Norfolk, this rural playgroup uses the village hall to offer both outdoor safe spaces and indoor spaces for your children to relax, play and learn. They had asked the Trust for support in their costs for first aid training for 4 of their adult volunteers. Seen presenting the cheque for £1,000 on behalf of the Trust, Alex Weston said "It's great that the Trust were able to help this very special playgroup in Ashwellthorpe and the people who give up their time so freely to make sure the children have a safe space to play and learn". 🖰

The charity needed a range of additional learning furniture and the Trust gave a grant of £2,000. "The grant has enabled us to purchase 3 new height adjusted tables and special supportive chairs. These children have special wheelchairs and having the tables adjustable makes the children have more access to everyday activities". o

The money was granted by the Trustees following their December meeting. A. At the time I was Roy Snelling's accountant and audit partner. After Roy's first wife Shiela died when Roy was understandably feeling very low he received an opportunistic call to try and persuade him to sell his business. Roy was shattered that anyone could be so insensitive and was determined to find a more lasting solution. I showed him a business near Wellingborough called Scott Bader which had been set up under a Commonwealth which Roy liked. We then enlisted the help of Ben Goodfellow a partner in DHP Solicitors and the R C Snelling Charitable Trust was established. At first it didn't own shares in the Group but the Trustees held regular meetings and were consulted as though they were fully involved in the business. This helped no end when Roy died and the shares were transferred to the Trust. It is an example of Roy's great foresight.

O. Looking back over your time what do you think is your greatest achievement?

A. I suppose being involved so closely in finding a long term solution to safeguard the businesses, everybody's jobs and promoting Roy's values. Since then it has been to try and build upon Roy's legacy.

Q. How did you come to be involved with Q. What gives you most pride about the people who work for the companies?

A. I think we still have many of the best family business attributes that really stand out. You might call them old fashioned, but I think they are beacons because when you are the customer you are delighted to find them. We remain a friendly company to do business with; our people are knowledgeable, they make meeting their customers' requirements their priority and they try to deliver a great experience.

O. What's your view of our future? Is it a good one?

A. The World continually moves on but without innovation there would have been no television and Snellings would not exist. So we should embrace chance and champion finding the right solutions for our clients. I have to remain optimistic.

A. I would like to have set up my own business
